Message from Pastor Tom

Funny how November begins with All Saints Day and (almost) ends with Thanksgiving. Maybe it's not so funny, but rather poignant.

When we make up a list of all of the things we are thankful for, we may discover that it is not a list of 'things' as such. My own personal list is filled with relationships, people who serve as inspirations, correctors, encouragers, comforters. These are the saints of our lives, people who help us to remember who we are and whose we are.

Every year on the first Sunday in November we celebrate the saints of our lives by lifting up the names in this church who have died over the past year. We also recognize that there are those who have been saints for us who are not part of this faith fellowship, and we lift up those names as well. If you have someone special in mind, please let me know and we will mention them in our prayers of thanksgiving during that Sunday.

I have also noticed some other folks who are saints, in a different way. We have just returned from a two week trip to Europe, in which we saw the wonders of Italy and reconnected with family members in the Czech Republic. We certainly saw our share of saints there, both in paintings of the master artists and in the people who took us into their homes and shared their food.

But I also discovered saints upon our return; people who didn't give looks of horror when we talked about our trip, but who sincerely wanted to hear about it, even to the point of seeing our pictures.

They must have known, in a deeply moving way, that whenever someone shows pictures of a trip they are transported back again, back to a time and place when they visited places with special people in their lives. That may be why people are so eager to show off their slides or pictures of their trips. They do that not to be a bore; they do it so they can be brought back again to a special place.

In a way, worship is like that. It can be for us a time to recall the pictures of our lives, to relive the special moments we spent with special people. That can be distracting, too; we can spend so much time in worship looking at the past that we don't take into account the new thing that God is doing with us today. But just as looking at the pictures of that trip can take me back to that gondola ride in Venice or the dinner with family in Pilsen, so worship can take us back to a time when we ate communion the first time with our Moms and Dads; or when our children were baptized or confirmed; or when we had a role to play in a Christmas or Easter play.

Worship can bring to mind special memories of the saints of our lives. Worship can also lift up the role that we play as saints in the church right now, forming special memories for others to celebrate in years to come.

I look forward to celebrating worship with you in November, starting with All Saints Sunday. May worship be a time filled with wonderful memories and joyful anticipation as we discover what new thing God is doing through us.

We appreciate your support of the earlier date for Commitment Sunday and hope you will prayerfully consider sharing God's blessings by pledging your time, talents and treasures.

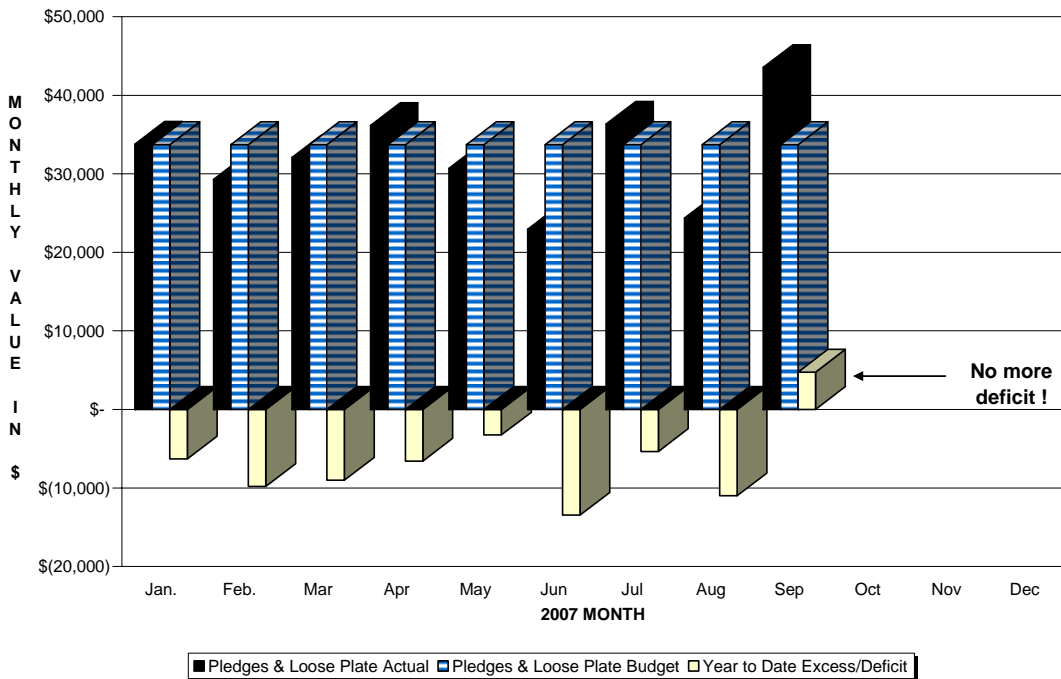

Last November, more than 20 % of the purchases were made via mail. Receipts and order acknowledgements were either sent by return mail or hand-delivered to the buyer.

People were busy. Many were elsewhere during the pre-Christmas shopping season. Some didn't live in the area. Yet, they searched the catalogue, made their choices, and hired good old Uncle Sam to complete the transaction.

This is not a description of the buying practices of our society in general.

It is a description of how the 2006 Alternative Holiday Market generated nearly \$17,000 for the eighteen non-profit ministries doing mission work around the world. Twenty percent of those dollars came from "Absentee Shoppers." Additionally, many of our Christian sisters and brothers in other churches have become regular participants as absentee shoppers and are included in these tabulations.

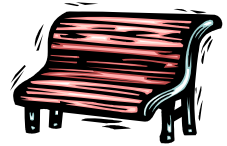

The Way it Was in Bible Times -- If you ever were interested in how people lived in tents, what people ate, or what cosmetics were used in Abraham's day, this book is for you.

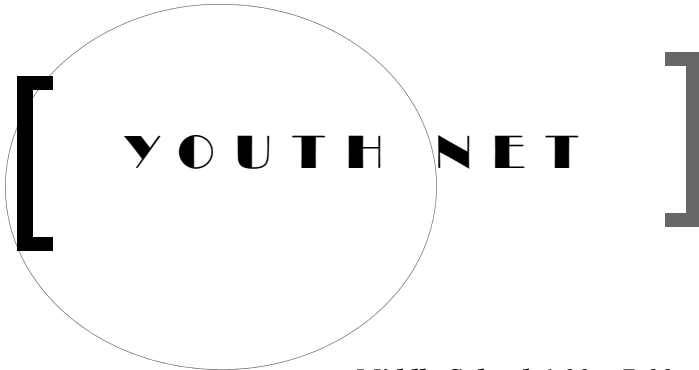
Modern Parables -- The timeless truths of the scriptures are presented in the language of today in a collection of stories from everyday life.

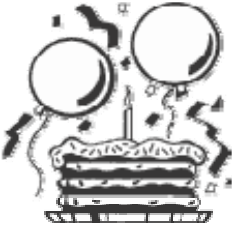

These hauntingly hungry goblins are dying to get their claws on your leftover Halloween candy!

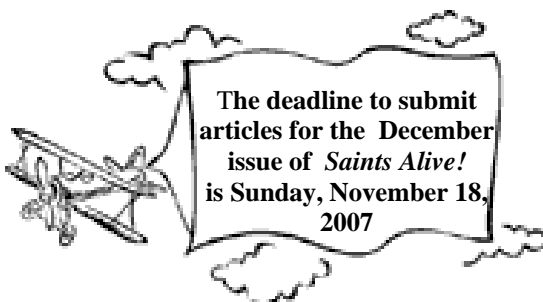
