Message from Pastor Tom

As you have probably noticed, Easter is WAY early this year – about as early as you can get. Technically, Easter is the first Sunday following the first full moon following the Vernal Equinox. That may sound like a strange way to decide the date of a holy day, but it's been that way since Athanasius, Bishop of Alexandria, suggested to the Council of Nicea in 325 that this would be a good idea.

So that means sometimes, more often than not, Easter is in April, even as late as the 22nd. But it can also be in March, as it this year, on the 23rd.

In places like Florida or Texas, that is not such a big deal. But around here we know that the plants aren't even thinking about popping up that early, unless we get a warm front for a few days. Last year, with Easter on the 8th of April, we got eight inches of snow. It looks like we might get more of the white stuff on our lilies this year.

But of course Easter is so much more than complaining if it comes early. Easter is the day for followers of Christ, the day that everything else flows in and out of, the day that informs and engages everything else we do. The old reformer John Calvin wanted churches to celebrate every Sunday like it was Easter Sunday, the day of resurrection. That's another reason why our gathering for worship is on a Sunday and not some other day of the week. It was the first day of the week that the disciples went to the tomb and found it empty. So every Sunday, whether it

is in March or July or October, is a celebration of Easter.

Without Easter, death has the last word.

Without Easter, despair is a constant, and never changes.

Without Easter, we are left with slogans of resignation, such as "It is what it is," as we deal with the brokenness around us the best way we can.

With Easter, death does not have the last word. God has the last word over death. That word is resurrection.

With Easter, life always has the potential to spring up where you least expect it. No situation, no circumstance, no occasion is exempt from the power of God-given life to break in.

With Easter, hope is always present. This is the power of hope that a plant will break through the soil, but it is also the hope that a new opportunity will arise. It is the hope that things will change. It is the *expectation* that new life will occur.

In his book *Credo*, the late William Sloane Coffin noted, "Hopelessness adapts. Hope resists." Hope does not casually accept things the way they are. Hope looks for ways that new life can break in, that change can happen to energize people with Easterness.

May you have an Easter filled with life, hope and change – even if it does come a bit early!

W Financial Report

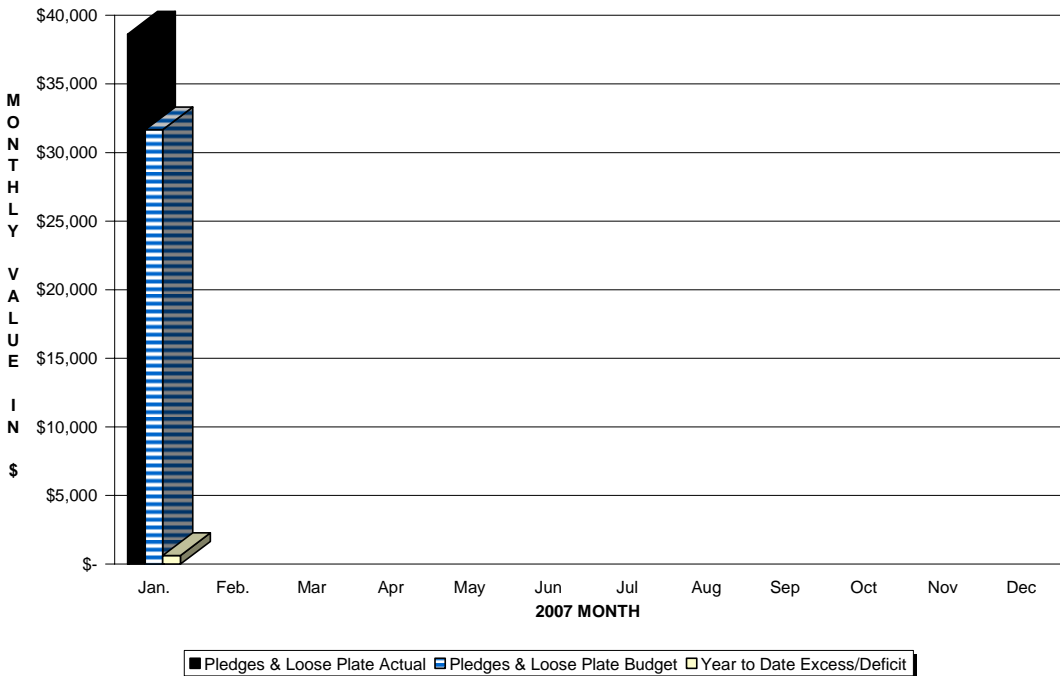
e are starting off 2008 well. We had a surplus of a little over \$600 at the end of January. This is especially good since we must pay our entire \$11,460 Per Capita assessment in January. As you can see from the graph below we had a very good start to our giving for the year. Many people paid all or part of their 2008 pledges ahead at the end of 2007 which gave us a good start for the year. We thank those people as this obviously helps us get the year off to a good start. Let's keep up the good trend throughout the year.

We have collected \$4,824 for Per Capita through January versus our projection of \$5,500 in the budget. This is a great start and we keep getting more each week in the collections. Thanks to all of you who have given, and there is still time for others to give to help us meet or exceed our goal.



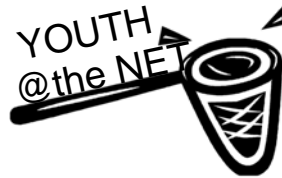
Together we were able to raise an amazing total of \$1,011.00.

These are all new additions purchased for the library. Many are about Jesus, which dovetails nicely with our current 50-Day Adventure.

The Importance of Being Foolish: How to Think Like Jesus – Christianity is not about “being nice.” Instead, we are called to be foolish in the face of the world as we follow Jesus.

Were You There? - Finding Ourselves at the Foot of the Cross – We all were “there” at the foot of the cross: in fearful Pilate, in promise-breaking Peter, in doubting Thomas, in the noisy crowd.

What Jesus Meant – What Jesus says in the gospels surprises and provokes all who claim to know what he meant. It is harder to take and to avoid.

Jesus: Our Spiritual Director – Take a pilgrimage through the gospels and encounter Jesus as personal spiritual guide. The texts come to life as a continuing conversation between Jesus and his disciples then and now.

Soul Brothers: Men in the Bible Speak to Men Today – Biblical figures, usually presented one-dimensionally, are given more depth here. Along with painted portraits these stories can increase understanding of the spiritual realm.

Christ the Lord: Out of Egypt – A novel about seven-year-old Jesus and his family on their return journey from Egypt. Young Jesus learns about his amazing birth and frightening ability to work miracles.

What is a Passover Seder?

Passover is the Jewish holiday that celebrates the Israelite's freedom from slavery in Egypt. God persuaded Pharaoh to let the Israelites leave Egypt after a series of ten plagues. The final plague was the death of all the first born in Egypt. The Israelites were told to mark their homes with the blood of a lamb, and God would then "pass over" their homes during this plague. The Seder is an actual ceremonial meal that commemorates the Exodus and God's power, grace and redeeming love.

HOW OLD WERE YOU WHEN YOU FIRST LEARNED TO SHARE?

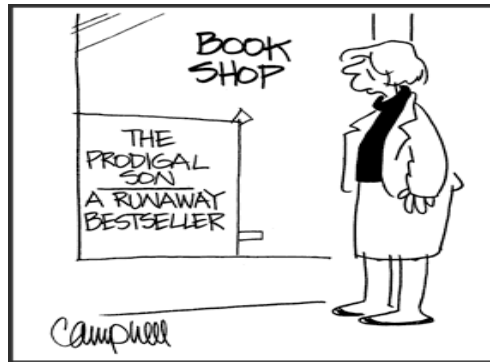
So young, probably, that sharing ---giving up part of what you believed was rightfully yours--- seemed like an unjust sacrifice. As a small child, you may well have responded, “Noooo, it’s MINE!”

Over time, however, we come to realize that all our gifts come from God, and that sharing actually enriches us too. In blessing others with our gifts, goodness and love flow from our hearts. Then the circle is completed when that blessing returns to us, subtly but surely changing us and leading us to respond even more generously to God’s call ‘to do good and to share what we have.’

One Great Hour of Sharing offers us an opportunity to share with people in need around the world, giving them much more than a handout--- the mother in Appalachia who has no means to earn money for her children’s books---the African girl looking for a source of clean water close to home so she doesn’t have to spend hours each day carrying it from miles away---the father in Bangladesh whose home and fields were destroyed by flood who doesn’t know how to feed his children until the next season’s crops are in.

On Palm Sunday, as we contemplate our gifts to the *One Great Hour of Sharing*, let us thank God for the power of sharing to transform lives---our own and those of all God’s children in need around the world.

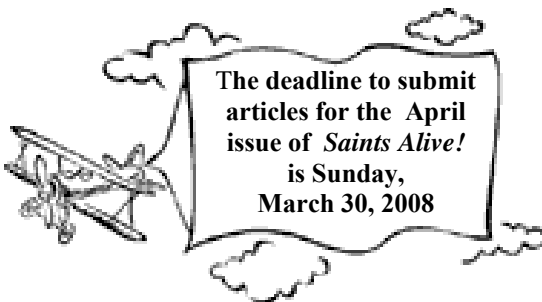
