Message from Pastor Tom

“Life comes at you fast,” the ad says, but it seems to hit an extra gear during the month of May. Graduations, weddings, recitals, athletic events are either here or on the near horizon, and our palm pilots struggle to keep up.

Back when we lived in Michigan, we had a beautiful flowering crabapple tree in our small front yard. During the second week of May, it hit full bloom, coloring our bedroom with a vibrant shade of pink. We have pictures of the kids by that tree, usually with Mindy in one of her recital outfits. In those pictures everyone looks so calm, but what I remember was the mad rush to get ready and everyone out the door.

In the church, it’s no different. The first Sunday is Communion, as are the first Sundays of every month. But May has an extra twist to it in that this is also Wills Emphasis Sunday. It’s a good reminder that the ministry of the church of Jesus Christ goes on beyond our lifetimes; that we can be involved in the work of the church by the money that we designate, for this church or some other ministry which is close to our hearts. We have an Endowment Fund here for people to make contributions, and the Presbyterian Foundation also has funds that support various mission workers and projects all over the world.

The second Sunday this year is not only Mother’s Day, but Pentecost. This is “the birthday of the Church,” the third great Christian festival, behind only Easter and Christmas. As per usual, this is a day to wear

red to worship, to symbolize the giving of the gifts of the Spirit. In addition, Pentecost this year marks the receiving of the Confirmation Class into our fellowship during the 11 a.m. service. Witnessing the Confirmands affirm their faith while holding their lit candles symbolizing the light of Christ leading their journey is always a special moment.

The Sunday after that will be the Sunday in which we will receive new members, and the last time I checked with our Membership-Leadership Team (who coordinates the classes), we will have a very interesting group. Some of our new members will be joining us from our former sister church, Bosworth Road Presbyterian, which shut its doors last August. Their joining us reminds us of our connection as brother and sister followers of Jesus Christ.

The last Sunday in May will mark the beginning of our summer schedule, with just one service at 10 a.m. That Sunday – on Memorial Day weekend – will mark the installation of the new officers for the Presbyterian Women. That afternoon our community will gather at St. Joe’s Church for the annual Avon Lake High School Baccalaureate service at 3 p.m.

And then we just collapse.

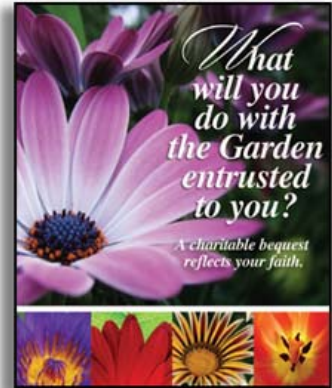

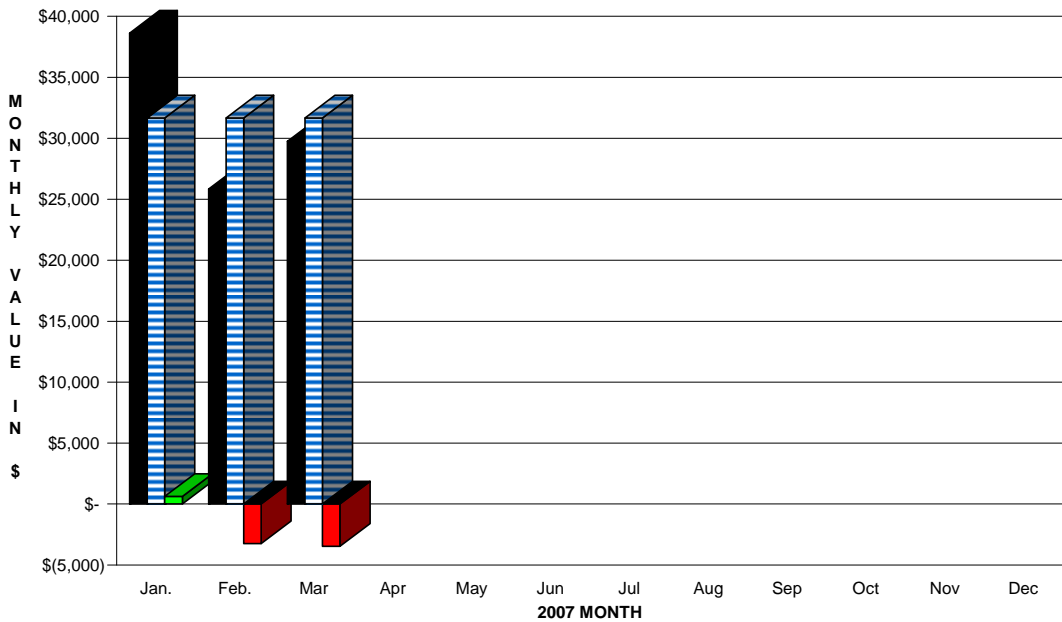
FINANCIAL REPORT

We were just slightly behind for the month of March as we finished with a deficit of just over \$200 for the month which puts us behind by \$3,456.95 year-to-date. On the income side, General Fund giving (pledges) is slightly ahead of the budget. Our loose plate (non member and visitor) giving is behind the budget estimate. On the spending side, the only expense significantly over the budget is utilities, which is not surprising. We budget the utilities as a straight line throughout the year and obviously our biggest expenses are in the winter months to heat the building. Please keep up the giving and invite someone new to come to church.

We have collected \$5,624 for Per Capita through March versus our projection of \$5,500 in the budget. Thanks to all of you who have given, and there is still time for others to give to help us further exceed our goal.

Family Promise of Lorain County **(aka... Interfaith Hospitality Network)**

Family Promise opened their doors to homeless family's right here in Lorain County, on Sunday, March 23rd. We here at ALPC opened our doors for our very first Family Promise host week on Sunday, March 30th. Our first host week ran very smoothly thanks to all the volunteers who spent time with our host family, and also to all those who worked ever so diligently "**behind the scenes**" to prepare us for our week by making sure we fulfilled all of the stipulations set forth by the State Fire Marshall and our Local Fire Department.

One of the stipulations required by the State Fire Marshall is that we must have a Fire Watch. This means we need to have one person awake during our overnight shift. We were very blessed to have two volunteers (Bryan Crow and Josh St. Clair) step up to the plate for this new endeavor. Thank you so much Bryan and Josh! They split the week between each other in volunteering for our **Night Watch** so that our overnight volunteers were not responsible for staying awake on their shift. I would like to emphasize that as an Overnight Volunteer... you will NOT be required to stay awake, unless you volunteer to do so. We have a separate sign up for the Night Watch shift. So if you have been a frequent overnighter volunteer, rest assured, that shift has not changed.

With that said, we are however, looking for more Night Watch Volunteers, as there will be certain times during the year (like summer) when Bryan and Josh may not be available to volunteer due to both of them working the day shift. So, if you are a Night owl, or even if you and someone else would like to SPLIT the shift, please contact me for details!

We also have an opening for the Truck Driver/Bed Delivery Coordinator. This position was previously held by Jeff Mell. Thank you Jeff for your dedication in this coordinators' position; we will certainly miss you! A special thank-you goes out to Dennis Runyon who volunteered for this position during our first host week. We do need a permanent volunteer for this coordinators' position, however. This is a position that does NOT require training as you will not have any contact with the host families. You will just be in charge of delivering the beds/partitions to the next host church. If this sounds like something you would like to do to help us out with our local hands-on mission right here at ALPC, please contact me at (440) 213-8758.

Our next host week will be here before we know it! The sign up board will be in the church foyer, starting Sunday, April 27th, as our next host week begins Sunday, June 15th. Please consult your calendars and check the sign up board after church. If you have any questions, please don't hesitate to call. If you haven't volunteered in a while... we **STILL NEED YOU**, just because we may not have called you recently or you haven't been able to help out due to schedule conflicts in the past, please know that you are still **VERY** important to this mission and we welcome your willingness to serve those in need!

Pentecost – May 11 Wear Red for Pentecost

It may seem like we will be celebrating Pentecost early this year, but it is actually right on time. Pentecost literally means "fifty days" or "the fiftieth day." In the Jewish faith, it came exactly fifty days after the Passover and was the festival that celebrated the completion of the harvest. In the Christian community, Pentecost was the occasion of the outpouring of the Holy Spirit (Acts 2). Christians everywhere consider Pentecost as the birthday of the Church. "*When the day of Pentecost came, all the believers were gathered together in one place. Suddenly there was a noise from the sky which sounded like a strong wind blowing, and it filled the whole house where they were sitting. Then they saw what looked like tongues of fire which spread out and touched each person there. They were all filled with the Holy Spirit.*" (Acts 2:1-4) We are asking everyone to wear red on Pentecost as it reminds us of the tongues of fire that surrounded the disciples. We will also provide birthday cake for everyone after both services to celebrate this joyous occasion.

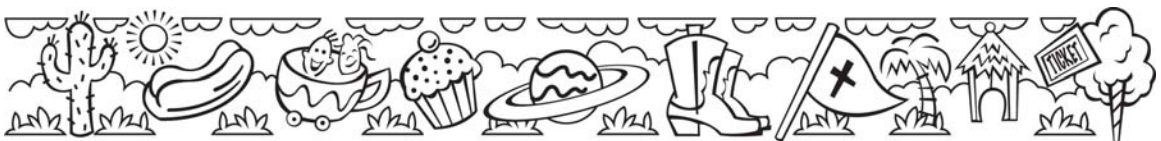

The Complete Idiot's Guide to the Bible – You are not an idiot, of course, but if you ever feel like one when it comes to the Bible, this book should be able to help.

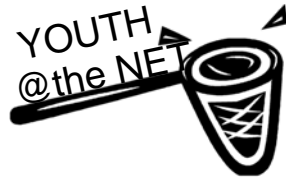

Their heads are filled with ideas, their hearts are filled with compassion, their bodies are filled with energy, and the Grade XIII seniors are ready to change the world. In Mark 16:15 Jesus spoke to the eleven disciples before being taken up into heaven. He directed them, “Go into all the world and preach the good news to all creation.” These two members of Grade XIII are taking their Lord at His word:

David Matthews, son of Rae and Gary Matthews, is a senior at Miami University of Ohio, majoring in International Studies (with an East Asian focus) with a minor in Japanese. He notes that he is working part time in the Department of German, Russian and East Asian Languages “to make a few bucks,” but it seems that in his work, Dave has found his passion, too. He says, “I’m quite enjoying the process of learning a new language, and I’ve recently started taking Chinese for fun.” Dave has also found a group of friends with whom he has become close, “We often share meals and hang out together when there’s no work to be done (or we feel like procrastinating).” Dave, however, is not planning to procrastinate much upon graduation; he already has important plans for a bright future. He reports, “In the near future I plan to travel to Japan and likely teach English there for a few years if I can.”

Anthony Damelio, son of Marillyn and Tony Damelio, will be graduating from Fordham University in May with a degree in Sociology with a minor in Spanish. In order to graduate in the honors program, Anthony prepared a thesis “addressing the topic of the influence of religion on Latino immigrants to New York.” In an e-mail received earlier this semester, Anthony noted that he was considering several post-college options, including “Yale Divinity School or Princeton Theological Seminary for further education after my undergrad work” or perhaps “the Young Adult Volunteer Program through PC (USA), which offers a year-long placement nationally or abroad. Also, I am looking for jobs here in New York or internationally, positions to transition me towards the field I finally decide.” No matter which avenue Anthony chooses, he is ready to take the next step in his journey into a wider world. He remarks, “I am about to enter a new phase of my life, which brings trepidation alongside excitement, and must trust in the decision I eventually make.”
