Message from Bill

I was reminded the other day that I'm very good at giving advice to others about taking care of themselves. But I'm very bad at taking my own advice. Well, with all this flu bug going around, sometimes it just takes getting sick for a few days (or being down with a bad back, like I was) to realize how much you wear yourself down and set yourself up for infection. So, this month's message from your Interim Minister is for you AND for me.

I found a checklist in a book called Confident Living. The title of the checklist is "What Shape Are You In?" Rate yourself from 1 (low) to 5 (high) on each of the following:

- _____ 1. I get enough sleep every night.
- _____ 2. I avoid eating too many "junk" foods.
- _____ 3. I get regular exercise every day.
- _____ 4. I am developing an interest in a sport or a program of exercise that can be continued (swimming, jogging, tennis, etc.)
- _____ 5. I get enough vitamins and minerals in my diet.
- _____ 6. I avoid substances that can make me lose control of myself.
- _____ 7. I feel good about my physical appearance.
- _____ 8. I avoid wasting food.
- _____ 9. My diet includes a lot of fish and poultry and not just beef products
- _____ 10. If I have to lose weight, I seek medical guidance and do it gradually.

How did you do? If you're honest, you found at least one area that you could work on. I've recently been reminded that whenever you get on an airplane, in the event the plane loses air pressure, the oxygen masks will appear. The flight attendants tell you to **PUT THE MASK ON YOURSELF FIRST**. Then and only then will you be in any shape to help your own loved ones or others around you. We have to take care of ourselves before we can be of any use to anyone else.

In his book, Healthy Congregations, Peter Steinke says that our willingness and ability to know the difference between our needs and other people's needs is called an IMMUNE SYSTEM. In the same way that your own body has an immune system to fight disease and infection, your ability to know where you end and other people begin is also an immune system that creates healthy relationships.

I'm absolutely convinced that when Jesus said, "Love your neighbor as yourself," it wasn't so much of a command as it was a statement of fact. That is, the amount of love (honest self-care) that you can give yourself determines exactly how much love you have to give to your neighbor. You really DO love your neighbor in the same way that you love yourself.

They don't call us the Body of Christ for nothing! You think maybe we could all start taking better care of it?

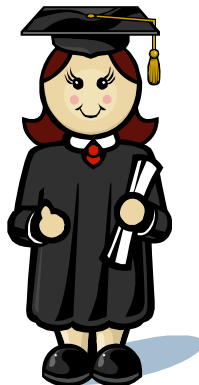

Interim Update

It occurs to me that the start of my ministry with you, coming just two weeks before Christmas, didn't provide the opportunity to adequately explain this thing called *Interim Ministry*. Perhaps as we prepare for Lent and Easter, on this side of the New Year, it might be a good time to let you know what to expect over the coming months.

I'm sure you know well the old yarn—someone once defined *insanity* as doing the same thing over and over again and expecting different results. You do it. I do it. Everyone does it from time to time. We make the same mistakes over and over until finally a little light comes on over our heads and suddenly—Bing!—we see it all so clearly! Well, believe it or not, churches do the same thing! *Interim Ministry* came about as a way for churches to have that “Aha!” moment too.

Interim Ministers help churches to:

- **Come to terms with their history** (*What brought us to this place and time?*)
- **Discover a new identity** (*What image do we want for ALPC to project to the community and to the world?*)
- **Get accustomed to a new way of leading** (*Whose church is this? What leadership skills do we possess to help lead us into the future that God is already preparing?*)
- **Strengthen denominational connections** (*What is our relationship to the larger church?*)
- **Prepare for the future** (*Where do we see ALPC in 5 years? 10 years? What will it take to get there? What kind of leaders do we need to help us create that future?*)

The heart of our work together will be **The Mission Study** which you will hear more about in the coming months. The first part of the Mission Study will begin right after Easter as we gather at Cottage Meetings in the homes of Elders. Once we've determined the meeting place and time, everyone can attend whatever meeting of their choosing. These meetings are designed to give each of us a chance to share our stories in a small group setting and to give a voice to any and everyone, as we begin the process of sharing our hopes, dreams, and wishes for Avon Lake Presbyterian Church.

And now for the Alphabet Soup: The 2nd part of the Mission Study will follow, with the goal of having the Pastor Nominating Committee or PNC elected by the congregation by June. Their first order of business will be to complete the Church Information Form or CIF that serves as the church's resume. This is what pastors see when they are looking for churches. The document that pastors complete is called the Personal Information Form or PIF. This is what the Pastor Nominating Committee will see many times as it discerns God's calling in the search for an installed pastor. So, (are you ready?) the PNC of ALPC must complete the CIF and send it to the

PC(USA) (You shouldn't have to explain that one!) so that it can begin reviewing PIF's.

So, there you have it: a basic understanding of what Interim Ministers do and a basic timeline in which to do our work together. You can expect a phone call or hallway conversation from me real soon! And if you haven't already done so, I also hope you'll take the initiative and fill out a slip to "Have a Meal with Bill." I want to visit with each of you so that you can tell me your story and I can tell you mine—and together we can see how we are in God's continuing story.

The future looks brilliant and exciting! I have a suspicion that it will get even brighter with each passing day! Let's get started!

Making Sense of Your Cents

The best places to find tax forms and information to make sure we give to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and yet retain as much as possible for Kingdom work.

By now you would have received all of your important tax reporting forms—your W-2s, your 1099s, interest reporting forms and the rest. The time to start the process is now, and if you're filing your taxes by hand and mailing them in (only 30% of us still do), the IRS has a wide variety of free tax forms and publications available to you—on a wide variety of topics. Getting your tax forms and publications should not be an issue as they are made widely available in just about any media that you want.

Five Ways to Obtain IRS Forms and Publications

If you need IRS forms, here are five easy and free ways to get the information you need directly from the IRS:

1. **On the Internet:** All IRS forms and publications are freely available on the IRS Web site at IRS.gov. Probably the easiest and most widely used way to get tax forms.
2. **By Phone:** You can call 1-800-TAX-FORM (800-829-3676) Monday through Friday 7:00 am to 10:00 pm local time to order current year forms, instructions and publications as well as prior year forms and instructions. You should receive your order within 10 days.
3. **In Our Community:** Both the Avon Lake and Avon libraries offer free tax forms to patrons. They also have copies of commonly requested publications.
4. **By Mail Order:** You can order your tax forms from the IRS National Distribution Center at 1201 N. Mitsubishi Motorway, Bloomington, IL, 61705-6613. You should receive your products 10 days after receipt of your order.
5. **Taxpayer Assistance Centers:** There are TACs all across the country where IRS offers face-to-face assistance to taxpayers, and where taxpayers can pick up many IRS forms and publications. Our closest TAC is at 1240 E. Ninth Street, Cleveland 44199 (Monday-Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.).

FINANCIAL REPORT

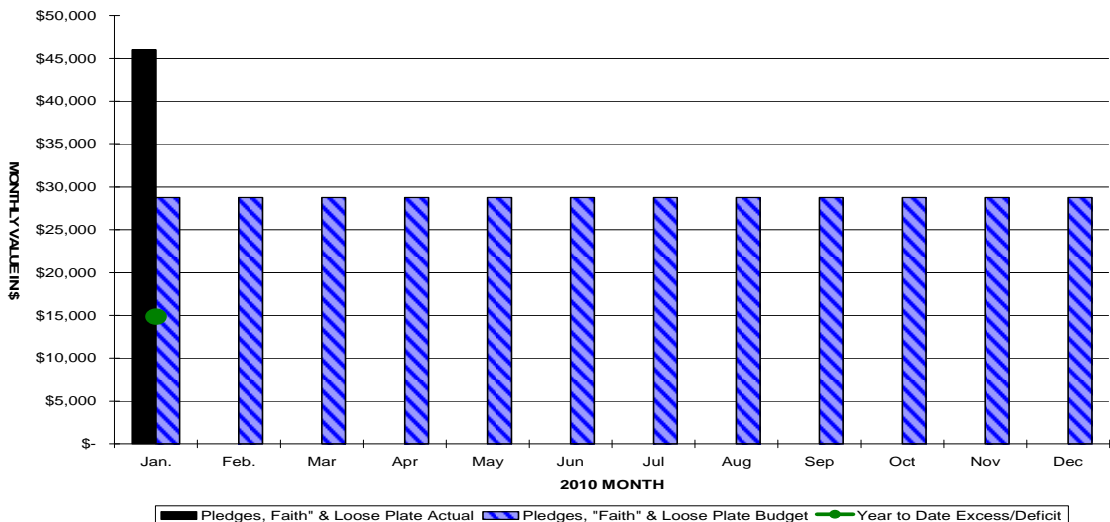
We have started 2010 on a very good note. We have a surplus of \$14,853.77 at the end of January. This is the first time in a couple of years that we have not started the year with a deficit. This is especially good news given that we had to pay our entire Per Capita bill of \$11,475.31 on January 31. Many of you paid part of your 2010 pledges ahead in 2009 which helps substantially with our cash flow at the beginning of the year. We've also collected \$3,743.72 in Per Capita offerings through the end of January. We haven't hit our goal of at least \$5,500 but we will always accept these offerings anytime throughout the year. As a reminder the bill to our church is \$21.29 for each member. If you have not contributed to the Per Capita offering you can just make a check out to the church and mark it Per Capita in the memo line.

Our pledges received have now exceeded our projection in the budget but we still have a long way to go to make up our \$82,129 of Faith in God and money from savings that we used to balance the budget. We obviously have made a very good start. May God continue to bless us and inspire all of us to give joyfully of the abundance that He has bestowed upon us.

If you would enjoy working on finances of the church I'd like to extend an invitation to join Terry, Marcy, Sharon and myself as a member of the Finance Committee. We are a little different than other committees as we meet every Sunday after church to count the offering. Please stop by the office after the service if you would like to join us. We would love the help.

TRASH TO TREASURE TO MONEY FOR MISSION

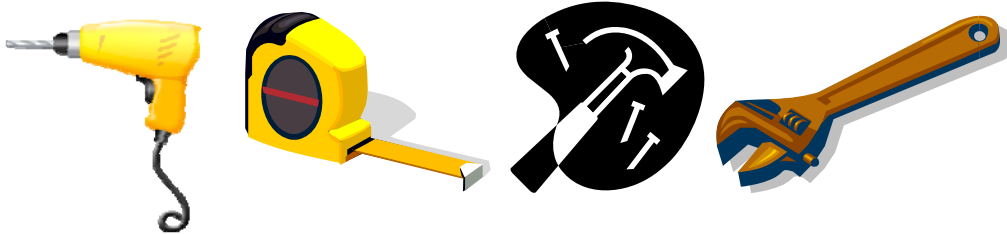

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

Regular Session Meeting—February 15, 2010

Learned that:

- 142 persons received communion in worship on February 7, and 2 persons received communion in their residences.
- Communion by Intinction will have precut bread from now on, for sanitary reasons.
- Thanks to your generosity, our financial picture at the end of January looked good, and we were able to send off over \$2600 to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance for Haiti.
- The work of separating our sanitary and storm sewers will begin very soon.
- Bill is meeting with the Presbytery of the Western Reserve stated clerk and a member of the Committee on Ministry to begin initial planning for our ALPC Mission Study.
- Bill is addressing our Immediate Needs, Improvement in Communication, Organizational Development and Leadership Development--all of this while making dozens of Pastoral Care Calls and Getting-to-Know-You Visits. Wow! There's a lot on his plate, and all of it to help us become a more vibrant church and better disciples of Christ.

Approved:

- The Annual Statistical Report on ALPC, sent to the PCUSA through our Presbytery. If you are curious about how many active and inactive members we have, how many members are in what age bracket, or how many children are in our Christian Education Program, just ask the clerk for a one page summary.
- Taking on a Pilot Project, in conjunction with the Lorain Co. Court System, which will allow non-violent youth offenders to work off community service requirements at ALPC. Need to know more about this? Ask any Session member to share with you the *parts* and *precautions* of this great mission outreach project.

Heard:

- Your generosity made it possible for us to send financial support to the 2-Cents-a-Meal hunger center recipients, to Lucy Idol, to the Lorain Co. Cooperative Ministry, and to Church World Service for blankets and tools.
- Along with the giving of our dollars, we need to be giving our whole selves in Hands-on Mission.
- The Deacons are calling on visitors within 24 hours of their being in worship, in order to welcome them and invite them to return. **You can make that same invitation to visitors who sit near you in worship.**

One Great Hour of Sharing- Palm Sunday March 28th. This is one of our four PCUSA offerings. Donations are divided among The Presbyterian Hunger Program Self-Development of People and Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, working in concert with Action by Churches Together (ACT), Alliance and Church World Service.

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance has been extremely active in Haiti...

“Food, water and 35,000 hygiene kits and baby kits at 15 distribution sites. Temporary shelters for the many people left homeless. Supplies and vital infrastructure support including electrical, water, sanitation and security at Hôpital Sainte Croix (Holy Cross Hospital) in Leogane, one of the few operating medical facilities in the region, and the Faculty of Nursing Science of the Episcopal University of Haiti (FSIL). Initial assessments and ground work for community psycho-social recovery.”

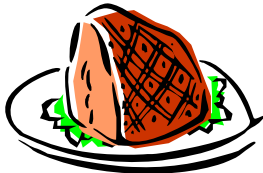
Additional information will be in the Sunday bulletins and Shirley Hook is anxious to share her personal insight into this giving opportunity.

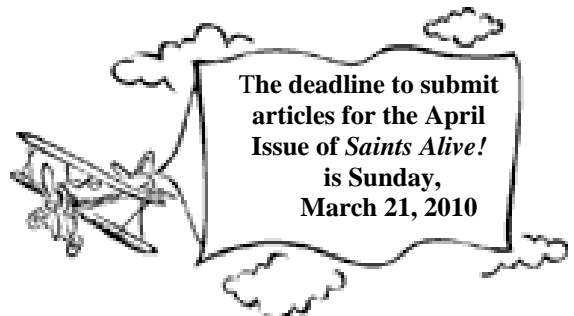


Keys for the Church
